Have you explored Cheese Ranch Historic & Natural Area?



Located in the northeast portion of Highlands Ranch, Cheese Ranch Historic & Natural Area is not only a peaceful location to take a walk but is also a local area that honors the history of Highlands Ranch.

In 1879, John Welte and his brother-in-law Plaziduo Gassner purchased the land upon which the Big Dry Creek Cheese Ranch would be built for \$700. This ranch became an integral part of the early growth of Douglas County.

Cheese Ranch operations included the production of Limburger and brick cheese, as well as dryland farming. Producing both cheeses increased efficiency and minimized waste. Limburger cheese was made from sweet milk, and the remaining milk was then used to produce brick cheese. These innovative dairying and farming practices allowed the ranch to operate into the 1930s, with its most successful period occurring between 1880 and 1910.

In addition to contributing to the growing economy of Douglas County, Cheese Ranch also served as a popular social center for local residents and visitors from Denver. Young and old would ride to the ranch on occasion, drink their favorite beverages and enjoy the delicious cheeses. It was possibly the first charcuterie boards enjoyed in Douglas County.

The Metro District is proud to share the rich history of the area on-site through recently refreshed interpretive signs so current and future generations gain a better understanding of those who settled our area and the unique industries of the time.

Puzzled about stormwater management in our open space?



Managing stormwater is an essential part of protecting our community. It involves building and maintaining channels, pipes, and open spaces that safely carry rainwater away from homes and businesses and into nearby waterways—reducing erosion and the risk of flooding.

The Metro District is responsible for maintaining stormwater channels located in our open space. To ensure these channels continue to function effectively, the Metro District follows a long-range improvement plan focused on reducing erosion and safeguarding nearby properties. Stormwater fees paid by residents and commercial property owners help fund day-to-day operations and capital improvement projects.

The Metro District doesn't do this work alone. We partner with the Mile High Flood District (MHFD) on stormwater projects throughout the community. MHFD is a regional special district established by the Colorado state legislature in 1969 to manage stormwater across the Denver Metro area. Today, MHFD serves more than 1,600 square miles and nearly 3 million residents. Funded by property taxes, their mission is to protect people, property, and the environment through preservation, mitigation, and education.

This partnership has brought significant investment to Highlands Ranch. Since 1991, MHFD has contributed more than \$14.5 million toward stormwater capital improvements and more than \$700,000 for ongoing maintenance within our community. In 2026, the Metro District and MHFD will team up on a \$1.35 million dollar project in Dad Clark Gulch. Additional details about this project can be found on Page 5.

The Metro District values its long-standing partnership with MHFD. Together, we're able to deliver high-quality, cost-effective stormwater improvements that protect our open space and preserve the community for years to come.

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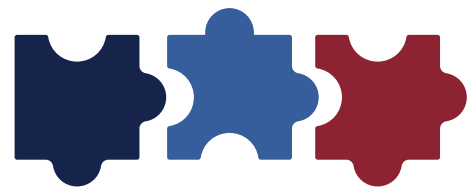
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Property taxes: It takes a village



In Highlands Ranch, a homeowner with a home valued at \$750,000 will pay \$4,905 in 2026 for property tax year 2025. While the payment is made to Douglas County, funds go to several local government agencies that serve the community. These organizations work together to provide a wide range of services including road maintenance, parks, trails and open space maintenance, K-12 public education, libraries, law enforcement, fire and emergency services, and so much more.

The amount of property tax you pay is determined by three factors: home value, residential assessment rate and the mill levy in your community.

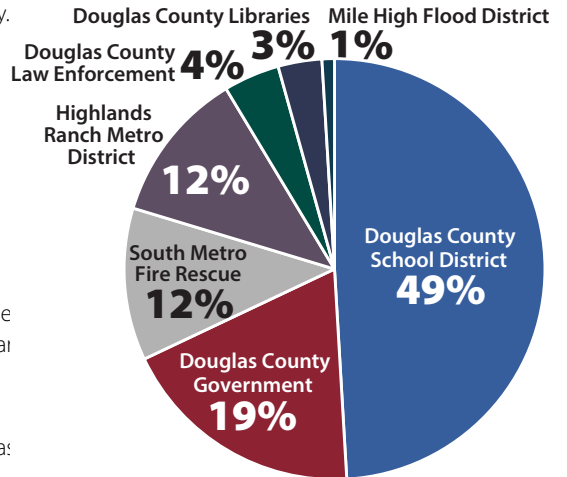
1. Home value is updated every two years and is determined by recent neighborhood sales.
2. The residential assessment rate is established by the state legislature. For property tax year 2025, the rate is 6.25% for local governments and 7.05% for school districts.
3. The mill levy is the property tax rate set by each government entity. Each entity must follow state statute and voter approved limits when setting the mill levy.

The total mill levy for homes in Highlands Ranch is 98.821 for property tax year 2025.

The formula for calculating property tax is:
Property value * Residential assessment rate * Mill levy / 1,000 = Property tax

The adjacent chart below shows the allocation of your property tax dollar to the various organizations.

Director district map being updated

The Highlands Ranch Metro District’s director region map breaks out the community into seven districts. Each member of the seven-person board of directors must live in or own property within the district they represent.

The current director district map was approved by the Metro District Board in May 2006, following the consolidation of four separate metro districts into a single district. That consolidation improved organizational efficiency and streamlined governance.

Nearly twenty years later, the community is approaching buildout, and several development plans have changed over time to better respond to evolving housing needs. As a result, the number of eligible electors within each director district is no longer evenly balanced.

Colorado Revised Statutes C.R.S. 32-1-603(2)(a)(II) requires director districts to be, as nearly as possible, contiguous, compact, and equal in the number of eligible electors. A recent review showed that minor updates to the director district map are necessary to meet these statutory requirements.

Updating the map will affect which individuals are eligible to run for and serve in specific board seats; however, it will not affect how residents vote. All seven board positions continue to be elected at large.

Board members will consider and vote on the proposed updated director district map prior to the end of the year. Find agendas for upcoming meetings at highlandsranch.org/agendas. Civic Green Park splash pad

The lower interactive fountains at Civic Green Park will undergo resurfacing and general repairs this spring. Improvements to the drains, new top surface coating and sealing gaps are necessary due to the age of the fountains. Work is anticipated to be complete, weather dependent, before the fountains turn on for the season during mid-May.



Civic Green Park playground replacement

This year, the 19-year-old playground equipment at Civic Green Park, 9370 Ridgeline Blvd., is scheduled to be replaced. Construction is anticipated to begin this fall. To help renew aging equipment, the Metro District schedules one or two playground replacements each year. Staff considers the condition of existing equipment and available budget when planning replacements. Join Metro District staff for a public input meeting at the playground on March 28 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. to learn more and share your feedback.

Dad Clark channel stabilization

Construction is underway on the channel stabilization project along Upper Dad Clark Gulch, from Wildcat Reserve Parkway to Summit View Parkway. The Metro District is partnering with Mile High Flood District on this project, which is expected to be completed in spring 2026. Construction focuses on restoring and stabilizing the channel, improving overall drainage function, and protecting the long-term health of our open space corridors.

Landscape conversion projects

Two areas along Santa Fe Drive – at Town Center Drive and Highlands Ranch Parkway – will be converted to more water-wise landscaping this spring and summer. These two areas were affected during the U.S. 85 Corridor Improvements construction project. Instead of re-establishing the previous water-thirsty bluegrass, new landscaping for the community entries will feature ornamental grasses, low-water Tahoma 31 turf, cobblestones, boulders and other more drought-tolerant plant material. Planning is underway for several other areas of parkway landscaping to be converted in 2026.

Trail addition

A new, paved trail spur from Royal Eagle Lane to the Saddle Ranch Trail south of Foothills Park is expected to begin construction the week of March 16. The Metro District is partnering with the Douglas County School District to create this new portion of trail. It will improve connectivity to

the Grand View Trail and will create a better connection for students in the neighborhood who will be attending Eldorado Elementary School (soon to be renamed Golden Ridge Elementary) beginning in 2026 due to the consolidation of Saddle Ranch Elementary School.

Highlands Ranch Mansion landscape improvements

This year, new garden bed enhancements and lighting will be added near the front historic drive of the Highlands Ranch Mansion, 9950 E. Gateway Drive. Additionally, plans continue for phased plantings to replace the 100-year-old junipers along the drive that are in varying states of decline. New understory Greenspire Linden tree plantings will grow and fill in as the older juniper trees continue to naturally phase out.

Toepfer Park improvements

Toepfer Park's playground reopened to the public last fall and has been a hit with kids and families. Several of the unique, inclusive play elements were made possible by two local ThunderRidge High School graduates. Katelin Fawcett and Bella Craner raised \$7,780 in donations through their Project Play senior project for three pieces of playground equipment that were included in the new design: a roller table, an accessible Konnection swing, and an Aro spinning chair.

"What inspired us to [help with] this playground is my little sister is disabled, and we wanted to find a way to make playing on a playground more inclusive and accessible for more kids," Craner said.



When replacing playgrounds, the Metro District strives to incorporate more accessible structures and play surfaces for all kids to enjoy. When approached by Fawcett and Craner with their senior project idea, the collaboration was a perfect fit.

Fawcett said they had a big sense of pride and amazement when they were able to visit the completed playground. "We're excited to see all the kids come out and play this summer," she said.

Stadium turf replacement

Beginning May 18, the synthetic turf will be replaced at Highlands Ranch Stadium at Redstone Park (formerly Halftime Help Stadium), 3270 Redstone Park Circle. The replacement project is in partnership between Douglas County School District and the Metro District. Portions of the northwest stadium parking lot will be closed for staging during construction, and work is expected to be completed by early July.

Highlands Ranch Mansion

The historic Mansion offers a setting well suited for milestone celebrations such as weddings, anniversaries and formal receptions. It is important to note the Mansion requires clients to select from one of their approved, full-service caterers along with hiring a professional coordinator. - The Mansion can accommodate up to 250 guests.
- The Mansion is rented for a base of five hours of event time. Additional event time can be purchased. Before your event time, three hours are provided for client access and vendor setup. After your event time, two hours are provided for cleanup.
- The Great Hall, the Mansion's largest and most versatile room, may be used for receptions, ceremonies and large meetings. It features high ceilings, exposed wood beams, and has accents of stone and brick walls.



Highlands Ranch Senior Center

The Senior Center provides flexible event spaces best suited for birthday and anniversary celebrations, graduation or retirement parties, club gatherings and family events. Its central location and tasteful amenities make it an affordable option for a variety of private events.

Highlights:

- A large multipurpose area, with maximum capacity of 240. The multipurpose area can be divided into three rooms, with rentals available for one, two or all three rooms.
- Meeting rooms, with capacities ranging from 25 to 95.
- Hourly/package rates are available.



Parks and outdoor shelters

Highlands Ranch parks and outdoor shelters offer ideal settings for casual celebrations during both spring and summer months. These spaces are commonly used for end-of-season sports team gatherings, birthday parties, graduations and family reunions. Outdoor shelters provide open-air environments that provide relaxed gatherings while offering amenities designed for group use. With locations across the community, parks and shelters make it easy to host outdoor events close to home.

Highlights:

- Community parks accommodate 40 to 100+ people; neighborhood parks accommodate up to 40 people. Please note, events of more than 100 people may require a special Metro District event permit.
- All facilities are available for use on a first-come, first-served basis unless they are reserved.
- Picnic Packs are outdoor games you can reserve to enhance your party's entertainment. The Metro District's Picnic Packs vary from volleyball to horseshoes, to games for the youngest crowd in mind.

At the Highlands Ranch Mansion, Mother's Day Open Hours has become a community tradition, offering a meaningful way for families and guests to celebrate in a place that has long brought people together. Each spring, families are invited to spend Mother's Day at the Mansion in a welcoming and relaxed setting close to home.

With free admission and an open house format, the event removes the pressure of planning and allows guests to enjoy the day at their own pace. Visitors are invited to explore the interior of the 27,000-square-foot Mansion through self-guided tours. Docents will be stationed throughout the home to answer questions and share local history. Guests are encouraged to stop by the bar, where mimosas will be available for purchase. While food will not be provided, guests are welcome to pack a picnic lunch to enjoy on the front lawn and take in the beauty of the Mansion grounds.



Historic Park: A new chapter for Highlands Ranch

The Metro District is thrilled to share a milestone decades in the making: the acquisition of nearly 200 acres of land adjacent to the Highlands Ranch Mansion – land that has been set aside for this very purpose since the community’s earliest days more than 45 years ago.

Originally envisioned as the *Future Historic Park*, this special place was always meant to be more than open space. It was designed to celebrate the history of Highlands Ranch while creating a special place for connecting with nature and providing educational opportunities for all ages.

How the Historic Park will take shape

The development of the Historic Park will unfold in three thoughtfully planned phases -- each one shaped by community involvement:

1. Planning: Listening and learning together

This first phase is all about you. The Metro District will focus on educating and engaging the community, gathering ideas, and learning what residents, local businesses, and Douglas County partners want the Historic Park to become. Using this feedback, a consultant will help develop a conceptual plan that outlines potential amenities, estimated construction costs, and a long-term operational approach. Before any work begins, the community will have a chance to review and comment on this conceptual vision.



2. Design: Bringing the vision to life

Once the conceptual plan is refined, the project will move into final design. This phase sharpens details, improves cost accuracy, and further evaluates how the park will operate. Community feedback will continue to play an important role as the final design takes shape.

3. Construction: Turning plans into place

Construction timing and phasing will be determined once designs are complete. The Metro District will explore whether amenities are built all at once or introduced over time -- always with flexibility and long-term value in mind.

Be part of the process

The Historic Park is being created with the community, not just for it. There will be many opportunities to share ideas, offer feedback, and stay connected as plans develop.

Celebrating 45 years of community building

Highlands Ranch celebrates a milestone this year – the 45th anniversary of our community. The community’s original developer, Mission Viejo Company, had a master plan for the 22,000 acres that would become Highlands Ranch.

The plan included:

- 50% development
- 40% open space
- 10% community use

Mission Viejo Company founded organizations to provide services to the growing community out on the prairie. They established a special district for water & sanitation services (now Highlands Ranch Water) and a metropolitan district (today’s Highlands Ranch Metro District) to build the growing community’s infrastructure.

They also worked with and gained support from the Douglas County School District, the Douglas County Libraries and the Douglas County Sheriff’s Office to provide services to the community that would one day grow to more than 103,000 people.

Over that time, Highlands Ranch has been recognized as an award-winning master planned community as multiple generations of families have called Highlands Ranch home.

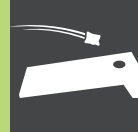

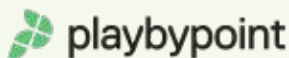

Changing water use one customer at a time

Highlands Ranch Water has always strived to achieve long-term resilient water supplies. Over the past 30 years, the district has met community water demand with an average of 85% surface water and 15% groundwater. By 2030 we expect to meet demand entirely with renewable surface water during normal and wet years thanks to capacity upgrades at our surface water treatment plant. At that point, we will only need to use groundwater during times of prolonged drought or when our surface water plant is offline for maintenance. But what about dry years? Conservation will close that gap.

Conservation is key to long term planning

In 2002, Colorado endured one of the worst droughts in state history, leading Highlands Ranch Water to implement a water budget-based billing system to encourage wise water use. Community demand dropped 20% after implementation, and even as the population continued to climb, water use remained on a downward trend, eventually plateauing in the 2010s.

In addition to water budgets, the district now has a robust conservation program with numerous rebates available for residential and commercial customers. A turf replacement rebate has been available since 2018, and a new rebate was introduced this year for customers who replace their toilets with high efficiency models.

Last year we created new low-water garden design templates, developed a plant database, and provided a list of local landscape companies for our customers utilizing the turf replacement program. The Highlands Ranch Water team is also converting irrigated landscapes at our office building and well sites to low water demonstration landscapes.

Our sister government, the Highlands Ranch Metro District, began their Parkway Landscape Conversion Program in 2020, setting an example for our community and supporting our message as they annually convert acres of non-functional high-water use turf grass to low-water landscapes. We've got our work cut out for us, but in a community where Kentucky bluegrass was once king, people are curious and things are starting to change.

As we look to 2026 and a dry season ahead, conservation matters more than ever, and its success depends on you. Small steps, from ColoradoScape yards to efficient irrigation, make a real difference. Pick your path and partner with us to conserve water today and protect our water supply for the future.

Do more this May, by doing less

Highlands Ranch Water is asking residents to get a jump start on their summer conservation actions by participating in No Mow May. The concept is simple: do not mow or reduce the frequency you traditionally mow your lawn during the month of May.

Reducing mowing frequency can significantly lower your lawn's water demand. Taller grass encourages deeper root growth, improving drought resilience during the heat of summer. You can still maintain a beautiful landscape, with less frequent mowing during No Mow May.

In a semi-arid state like Colorado, it's important for each of us to play our part in conserving such an important resource as water. Highlands Ranch Water partners with Resource Central to offer two incentive programs to help customers conserve water in their landscape – Garden In A Box and Slow The Flow.

What's in a name?

Last year wasn't the only time Highlands Ranch Water changed our name. Early in our history we were Mission Viejo Water and Sanitation District – aptly named after the developer of Highlands Ranch – Mission Viejo Company. It only took a few years after the district was formed for the leadership at the time to acknowledge the confusion of having two names so similar.

"We wanted to draw some distinction between the two to let people know that there were different services from different organizations," said Jeff Case, retired Engineering and Public Works Director for the district.

It was 1984 when Highlands Ranch was still in its infancy but growing fast and the water district needed its own identity. An article published in the *Douglas County News-Press* on Aug. 16, 1984, reports the water district sought the name change to avoid confusion. Later that fall the change was official and Mission Viejo Water and Sanitation District became Centennial Water and Sanitation District for the next 40 years.



A manhole in front of the district office building bore the original MVWSD (Mission Viejo Water and Sanitation District) markings. Upon discovery last month, it has been replaced, and the original hardware was preserved for historical purposes.

So where did the name Centennial come from?

Discussions began to select a new name. The filming of the NBC miniseries *Centennial* had recently taken place at the Highlands Ranch Mansion in 1978. The popular miniseries was based on the novel *Centennial* written by James Michener. The novel was about the fictional history of Centennial, Colorado.

The name Centennial also had factual ties to the state – Colorado became the Centennial state in 1876 on the 100th anniversary of the U.S. Declaration of Independence. According to the 1984 *Douglas County News-Press* article, there were numerous streets, buildings and districts in Colorado at the time that referenced Centennial. And thus, a new name was chosen.

Centennial Water and Sanitation District proudly carried the Centennial name for 17 years before the City of Centennial was incorporated in neighboring Arapahoe County. While the shared name sometimes led to understandable

confusion, it also reflects a common Colorado heritage rooted in history and location.
